At Access Communications, community is at the heart of everything we do. Every year, we strive to make a difference but in 2024 we worked hard to set a new standard.

Through our three pillars of giving — the Access Communications Children's Fund (ACCF), our community programming through AccessNow TV and a new addition through radio, and our corporate initiatives and sponsorships — we deepened our impact in ways that matter.

The Access Communications Children's Fund reached a powerful milestone, donating almost \$665,000 to 91 recipients across Saskatchewan. Since 1992, the ACCF has given more than \$4.1 million to support children in need, at risk, or among our most vulnerable.

We also deepened our commitment to the communities we serve. In Weyburn, we became the Showtime Sponsor for the new Credit Union Spark Cinema, helping bring stories and culture to life. In Estevan, we secured naming rights for the pool at the Estevan Leisure Centre now known as the Access Communications Aquatic Centre, creating a lasting connection to a space where families gather and grow.

In a historic moment for Access, we welcomed CJTR 91.3 FM — Regina's only community radio station — into our programming team. Now operating as AccessNow 91.3FM Community Radio, this expansion gives us an even stronger voice in telling local stories that matter to you.

These are just a few of the highlights. Inside this report, you'll find so many more stories that make us proud—stories of generosity, resilience, and community spirit across Saskatchewan.

To our volunteers, bingo players, staff, members, and supporters — thank you for standing with us.

At the heart of our co-operative beats a simple belief: every child deserves a chance. A chance to learn, laugh, be included, and be well. For more than 30 years, the Access Communications Children's Fund (ACCF) has turned that belief into action—quietly, powerfully, and with the unwavering support from the people of Saskatchewan.

Since its founding in 1992, the ACCF has donated more than \$4.1 million to support children who are in need, at risk, or among our most vulnerable. In 2024 alone, thanks to the generosity of our bingo players and supporters across the province, we contributed almost \$665,000 to 91 incredible community organizations.

These grants reached after-school programs, filled lunch boxes, built inclusive playgrounds, provided mental health support, and put books in little hands. Behind every dollar is a story of hope.

The Children's Fund focuses on three vital areas in supporting youth:

- Health and Wellness Nurturing the mental and physical well-being of children of all abilities.
- **Education and Literacy** Fueling futures by giving kids the tools to grow, learn, and dream.
- **Social Inclusion** Ensuring every child feels seen, heard, and valued.

The ACCF is powered almost entirely by proceeds from the Access Communications Children's Fund TV Bingo—but a bingo card is more than just a game. It's a lifeline. It's a book, a meal, a warm coat. It's a message that someone cares.

Thank you to every player who picked up a card this year. You are part of something extraordinary.

Regina Early Learning Centre

At the heart of the Regina Early Learning Centre (RELC) is a simple but powerful belief when we support children and families in their earliest years, we build stronger communities for generations to come.

The Early Years Family Resource Centre, operated by the Saskatchewan Early Childhood Association, provides welcoming, play-based environments where children can explore, grow, and thrive — and where families can access essential parenting support and community programs.

Thanks to a \$50,000 donation from the Access Communications Children's Fund, the Centre's location on Fifth Avenue is getting a vital refresh. The revitalized space will ensure that even more children and families can find a safe, engaging, and inclusive place to play, learn, and connect.

We currently have 110 children between the ages of 0-5 receiving age-appropriate quality books every month! It costs \$46.20 per child to receive 12 books (1 per month for a year). Your funding of \$4,982 enables us to cover the cost of purchasing the books for 107 children for one year!!!

We are a community-based non-profit organization with the goal of bringing quality literature into families' homes. Early literacy is vital in children's development and lays the foundation for future learning. We are proud to have the program in Nipawin and strive to sustain the program as long as possible through various fundraising events.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMMING WHERE YOUR STORY FINDS ITS VOICE.

That belief has always guided our community programming. Through TV and now radio, we give Saskatchewan a stage — and its people a voice.

In 2024, Access expanded community programming. We proudly welcomed CJTR 91.3 FM, Regina's only community radio station, into AccessNow operating as AccessNow 91.3FM community radio, this beloved station continues its mission of elevating local voices, artists, and causes — but now, with the strength, support, and sustainability that comes from being part of a community-owned co-operative. With CRTC approval at the end of 2024, this was more than a milestone — it was a promise to keep community radio strong, independent, and rooted in the place it calls home.



Meanwhile, AccessNow TV continues to bring Saskatchewan to life on screen — now in 110 communities and growing. With 70% of our content created by local community producers, the stories we share aren't just about the province—they're about you. Your teams. Your talent. Your traditions. We cover everything from local sports to arts and culture to city council meetings — because local matters, and so do you.

That commitment shines brightest during the moments that bring us together. In 2024, our live broadcasts of the Regina Humane Society Telethon, the Weyburn Communithon, and the United Way of Estevan Telethon helped raise more than \$530,000 for local causes. These aren't just programs — they're acts of love that show what's possible when a community rallies together. AccessNow TV and AccessNow 91.3FM are more than just platforms. They are where your story finds its voice.

This is more than programming: It's purpose. It's passion. It's people.



At Access Communications, we do more than connect you—we invest in spaces that bring people together and create real opportunities.

In 2024, we proudly became the Showtime Sponsor of the Credit Union Spark Cinema in Weyburn, helping bring film, culture, and community together under one roof. We also reached an exciting agreement with the City of Estevan to secure naming rights for the Access Communications Aquatic Centre inside the Estevan Leisure Centre — a place where families can gather, grow, and make lasting memories.



These investments join a growing network of community spaces we're proud to support, including the Access Communications Centre in North Battleford and the Access Communications Water Park inside the Gallagher Centre in Yorkton. Across Saskatchewan, these spaces represent more than buildings — they are places where community spirit lives and thrives.

Our commitment to the community doesn't end there. The 17th annual Access Communications Labour Day Show N Shine in Regina set a new fundraising record in 2024, raising \$51,805 for the Regina Food Bank. With over 5,000 attendees and more than 500 classic cars and motorcycles on display, this signature event brought people together for a powerful purpose. Since its inception, the event has helped provide more than 1.1 million meals to those in need across Regina and southern Saskatchewan.



A strong future starts with investing in youth — our scholarship program continues to grow in scope and impact. Last year, we awarded \$27,000 in scholarships — supporting tomorrow's leaders today. This included twenty \$1,000 scholarships through the Doug Alexander Scholarship Program, honouring our former Community Relations Manager. It recognizes high school students who excel in academics and community service.

When we invest in places where people gather, celebrate, and grow — we're not just supporting facilities. We're building belonging.



The Fred Wagman Scholarship Program — named after our first CEO — provided a \$2,000 Film & Video Scholarship and two \$1,000 Entrance Scholarships at the University of Regina. In addition, two \$1,500 scholarships were awarded at Saskatchewan Polytechnic to students enrolled in the Computer Networking Technician and Telecommunications Network Technician programs.
